Why does the COP need BSPO?

Black Student Pharmacist Organization was created with the intention of providing a social support group for Black and African-American students within the University of Georgia College of Pharmacy. During my second semester of pharmacy school, I noticed that the few programs about Black pharmacists left much to be desired. My classmates and I also noted various mentions of diversity and inclusion from the College but were unable to observe the actual manifestations. Likewise, in classes and engagements specifically designed to expose us to current professionals in the field of pharmacy, there was a notable absence that was painstakingly obvious-to us.

In addition to the noted absence of pharmacists who looked like me, there was a lack of unity and comradery amongst the Black students in the College. Seeing this blatant need, I thought it would be worthwhile to create those spaces that we were so noticeably absent from. Inspired by our sister chapter at the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Pharmacy, I set out to emulate a similar organization here in the College of Pharmacy.

By providing special programming that is geared towards our unique cultural experience, we aim to not only provide networking opportunities for Black students to connect with pharmacists that resemble themselves but to also expose the COP and Athens community to societal barriers that have historically limited African-American & Black individuals from obtaining access to higher education. This quarterly newsletter will serve as one of the vectors to educate the COP and increase social avenues that are safe in the time of a national pandemic. Enjoy!


