NAPLEX Performance


In order to gain state licensure to practice pharmacy, graduates of the PharmD program must pass the North American Pharmacist Licensure Examination (NAPLEX) offered by the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy (NABP). The Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education (ACPE) compiles statistics on the performance of all candidates who take the exam. The table below shows the NAPLEX pass rate of UGA graduates taking the test for the first time in comparison to the National average pass rate for graduates taking the test fort the first time. The pass rate for UGA PharmD graduates is consistently higher than the national average.
