Courses of Instruction

1. University of Georgia

Pharmacy Health Services and Outcomes, 2 credits (PHRM 5420), Professional program.

Role: Course Coordinator

Terms taught: Spring 2021, 2020, 2019, 2018

This course exposes students to medications use from a systems/population perspective and strategies to improve outcomes. Students apply previously learned knowledge to address social factors, organizational structures and processes, and patient behaviors that affect the quality of medication use in an effort to influence health and well-being of a population. Students also learn about processes for evaluating outcomes resulting from pharmacy-based patient care services.

Health Research Methods, 2 credits (PHRM 5220), Professional program.

Role: Course Coordinator

Terms taught: Spring 2019, 2018

This course exposes students to the scientific method and focuses on applying the principles, practices, and strategies for conducting research in the area of pharmacy and healthcare.

Research Methods in Pharmacy Care Administration, 3 credits (PHRM 8640), Graduate program.

Role: Course Coordinator

Terms taught: Fall 2020, 2019, 2017, 2016

This course reviews research methodology, including formulation of research questions and research hypotheses, selection of the research design, sampling, internal and external validity, data collection, data analysis, results presentation and discussion.

Social Behavioral Theory in Health Care, 3 credits (PHRM 8610), Graduate program.

Role: Course Coordinator

Terms taught: Fall 2020, 2018, 2014

This course critically examines social behavioral theory and research methods used by health services researchers, focusing on determinants of health and illness, the interplay between values, technology, economics, and patient care.

This course introduces students to essential clinical, professional, and practice-based skills needed to provide pharmacy care.

Essentials of Pharmacy Practice III, 3 credits (PHRM 4030), Professional program.

Role: Course Faculty

Terms taught: Fall 2018, 2017, 2016

This course introduces students to essential clinical, professional, and practice-based skills needed to provide pharmacy care.

Essentials of Pharmacy Practice IV, 3 credits (PHRM 4040), Professional program.

Role: Course Faculty

Terms taught: Spring 2021, 2020, 2019, 2018, 2017

This course introduces students to essential clinical, professional, and practice-based skills needed to provide pharmacy care.

Diabetes Disease State Management, 2 credits (PHRM 5080), Professional program.

Role: Course Faculty

Term taught: Spring 2020

The course focuses on the development of skills necessary to provide disease state management of patients with diabetes.

Pharmacy Skills Laboratory IV, 2 credits (PHRM 4130), Professional program.

Role: Lab facilitator

Term taught: Spring 2015

This course supports the development of skills and techniques necessary to render effective pharmaceutical care in a variety of settings, including prescription dispensing systems, medical charts, aseptic technique, human anatomy laboratory, and basics of physical assessment.

2. University of Wisconsin-Madison

Psychosocial and Management Aspects of Pharmacy, 3 credits (S&A PHM 411), Professional program.

Role: Co-Coordinator

This course introduces students to: (1) the public health care system and pharmacists roles in the public health care system, (2) the health care system and how pharmacy fits within the health care system, (3) the patient's perspective of health, illness, medication taking and patient-pharmacist interaction, (4) principles of educational assessment and patient consultation, and (5) skills and strategies to overcome barriers to individualized patient consultation.

Pharmacist Communication: Education and Behavioral Interventions, 2 credits (S&A PHM 652), Professional program.

Role: Co-Coordinator

This course focuses on principles and techniques of pharmacist communication with patients and provides an opportunity for students to refine their skills in: (1) interviewing and listening, (2) using educational and behavioral interventions, and (3) designing a program/ plan to increase pharmacist communication with patients, pharmacy staff and/or other providers/agencies.

Social Behavioral Theories in Pharmacy, 3 credits (S&A PHM 715), Graduate program.

Role: Co-Coordinator

The goal of this course is to critically review and apply social and behavioral science theories, methodologies, and research to problems in pharmacy, pharmacist interaction with consumers and other providers, health behavior and use of prescription and nonprescription drugs. Theories and methodologies are drawn from medical sociology, health psychology, and related fields. Students have the opportunity to (1) critically analyze selected theories and models as they relate to pharmacy/drug use/health behavior, (2) identify alternative methods of testing and operationalizing theories, (3) critique research approaches, design and measures; and (4) identify research needs and social behavioral strategies for improving care outcomes.

3. University of California-Davis

Freshman Seminar – Pushing Drugs? Consumers and Prescription Drug Advertising, 1 credit (FRS 001J), Undergraduate program. (Role: Coordinator)

This course focuses on concerns surrounding direct-to-consumer prescription drug advertising's (DTCA) impact on patients and health care providers. This course introduces students to federal regulations and public policy, characteristics, and the economic and humanistic impact of DTCA.
